I'm a strong advocate for digital photography and electronic image capture, and I've enjoyed being part of that evolution within camera clubs and the Photographic Society of America (PSA). I previously served as Chairman of PSA's Electronic Imaging Division and have been an active PSA member for more than 52 years. Along the way, I've remained deeply involved in PSA Study Groups and the Portfolio Distinctions program as a trained Assessor.

I've been honored to receive several PSA awards for service and leadership, including the Stanley B. Ashbrook, Jr. Memorial Award, the PSA Service Award, election as an Honorary Member of PSA, and the PSA Scales Award for Long-Term Service. I currently serve as Chairman of the PSA Society Recognition Awards Committee.

When I'm behind the camera, I'm especially drawn to architecture and landscapes. I enjoy exploring how light, structure, and a sense of place come together to tell a story. Photography, for me, is both a creative practice and a form of quiet reflection—a way to be attentive to God's creation, to see with intention, and to share what I've learned with others. The emergence of iPhone photography has opened exciting new opportunities in creativity and technology, and I continue to be inspired by how these tools have changed the way I see, create, and teach. I'm grateful for the opportunity to share that journey and encourage others as they explore their own photographic paths.

Composition Simplified

Repetition

Before the science of speech was developed, man expressed his Feelings with crude images carved on stone. These images are the earliest examples of story telling in picture form.

Later on, as man developed his intellect, these forms became more varied and expressive. Man's concept of form, as an expression of beauty, gradually developed until he was able to express his thoughts and Feelings in words as well as in pictures. The repetition of letters in words have meanings — and similarly repetition of Forms give meanings to pictures.

Repetition gives rhythm or swing to the picture. It can be made to express moods, thoughts or feelings.

Repetition plays an important part in modernistic art. It helps to establish a definite pattern and decorative quality. By its use, emphasis can be created in any part of the picture.

Too much repetition is disastrous, and should be avoided.

Its use in the decorative arts is invaluable. By repeating forms and arranging them into interesting patterns, one can create beautiful designs for wall papers, Fabrics, and advertising illustrations.

Once knowledge of this principle of repetition has been mastered, the Field for its decorative use is unlimited.



Improve Your Photos Displayed on Our Website

You might have noticed the slide shows on our <https://www.eccmacomb.com/indexPastEvents.html> Past Events Page__ have been improved recently, on your Desktop, Laptop, Tablet, and especially, your Phone. When you click a thumbnail on that page, all the photos submitted to that meeting or pertaining to that group shoot are displayed. If you click one of those photos, it enlarges to fill much of the screen and lets you move from photo to photo, or startup an automatic slide show. But I'd like to draw your attention to the text below the enlarged photos. Here is [Feb 20, 2025 Meeting Photos&ImageFolder=/MeetingPhotos/202502](https://www.eccmacomb.com/MeetingPhotos&ImageFolder=/MeetingPhotos/202502) an example of what can potentially appear using the 3 tips below__.

To have that information shown, you must supply the info within the photo you export for display during the meeting:

1. If you fill in the Caption field for your photo within Lightroom (Library Module - Metadata Subpanel), that caption will display directly beneath your photo, to the right of the filename. This lets you say a little (or a lot) more about the photo than the filename was able to convey.
2. Include your Metadata in the photos you submit. If you export from Lightroom with <https://www.eccmacomb.com/LightroomExportMeetingSettings.jpg> these metadata subpanel settings__, the website will display the date/time the photo was taken, and the camera settings on the second line of text. If you exclude Metadata, your settings and caption won't be exported, so nothing will display. Also, since the date/time isn't supplied, I can't identify that your photo was taken during a group shoot, so it won't appear in any group shoot slide show.
3. Put your copyright info into the photos you submit. You can <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=1uu-ugEdjD0> set lightroom up to do this automatically__, or use the copyright setting in many newer camera menus. Doing so will display your copyright info on the third line of text under your photo, asserting your legal ownership to every viewer.

Bonus tip: on the <https://www.eccmacomb.com/indexPastEvents.html> Past Events Page__ type your name into the search box, then hit the Search button, and you'll see all the photos you've ever submitted to the club. Do this on your phone, and you can show your club photos to your friends! Search works for any exact-matching word, partial word, or phrase in the filename, like 'tuscany' or 'owl', not just people's names.

Click Outside the Lines

Newsletter **only** challenge for next year!

Here is a way to make our newsletter more interesting and fun to read by having a newsletter only photo challenge. These categories do not align with anything for our club meetings.

Forget coloring inside the lines—or photographing inside the rules. These photo challenges are here to stretch your imagination, flex your creativity, and possibly confuse your pets. (Seriously, try holding your cat up for forced perspective. Good luck.)

1. **Color Quest**—Pick one color and let it guide your lens for the day.
2. **Blur-tastic**—Play with motion blur or intentional camera movement.
3. **Mirror, Mirror** – Capture reflections in water, glass, or anything shiny.
4. **Get a Grip on Grit** – Hunt for bold, unusual textures up close.
5. **Flip the Script** – Take a photo upside down and make the familiar feel strange.
6. **Mini but Mighty** – Turn small objects into heroes with clever framing.
7. **Wait... What?** – Find look-alikes: shadows, clouds, or objects that resemble something else.
8. **Lost in Space** – Make negative space the star of your shot.
9. **Photo Rembrandt** – Recreate a famous painting or artwork with photography.
10. **Pocket Giants** – Use forced perspective to make people or objects huge (or tiny!).
11. **Triple Shot Story** – Tell a beginning, middle, and end in three photos.
12. **Face It!** – Discover faces hiding in everyday objects around you.

From Idea to Ending: A Story Writing Framework

By George Norkus

Writing a story is easier when you break it into parts. The outline below will help you organize your thoughts and develop a clear beginning, middle, and end.

A story must have: (These do not need to be in this exact order.)

Setting, Plot, Conflict, Character & Theme

1 What or Who is it about? (Character or Item)

2a What is “it” suppose to do?
(or)

2b What does the “character” want to do?

3 Why can or can't they get or do whatever “it” is?

4 What they do about to answer the problem. (If there is a problem)

5 Why does or doesn't “that” work?

6 How does it end? (Hopefully a good ending)

Suggested Leverage Writing (Simple ways to expand on your story)

1 Show your “Human Side”

This will engage and create more loyal followers.

2 Share your backstory

Might tell others where I came from and history, etc.

What did I do as a pivotable moment in time?

3 Develop a Narrative

Tell about things happening, go into more detail and share more.

4 Inspirational Message

Be sure it is acceptable with my audience.

5 Use customer stories

Similar to a person writing about how they do something.
